Pretzel Horseshoes

Sweet, salty, crunchy and shaped like a horseshoe. What's not to like about this easy, quick recipe?

Ingredients

- > 1 package (10 ounces) large marshmallows
- 3 tablespoons butter, cubed
- > 5 cups crushed pretzels
- > 1 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- > 1/2 cup butterscotch chips

Directions

Place two 5" diameter bowls upside down in the center of two 9" round pans; coat bowls and pans with cooking spray.

In a large microwave-safe bowl, melt marshmallows and butter on high for one minute. Stir in pretzels. Quickly add chips; stir gently until coated. Divide mixture in half. Press one portion evenly into one prepared pan. Shape into a horseshoe by forming mixture around bowl, leaving a 4" opening at one end. Repeat with remaining mixture. Cool for 15 minutes.



Remove bowls. Run a knife around edges of pans to loosen. Invert each onto a serving platter. Reshape horseshoes by gently spreading sides apart to elongate if necessary. Cool completely.

Yield: Two horseshoes (14 servings each).

Ingredients

- > 2 cups cooked corn, fresh or frozen
- > 1 avocado, cut into ½-inch cubes
- > 1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved
- > 1/2 cup finely diced red onion
- Large "handful" of alfalfa sprouts
- > 2 tablespoons olive oil
- > 1/2 teaspoon grated lime zest
- > 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice

- > 1/4 cup chopped cilantro
- > 1/4 teaspoon salt
- > 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Directions

Combine the alfalfa, corn, avocado, tomatoes and onion in a large glass bowl. Mix together the dressing ingredients in another bowl and pour over the salad. Toss gently until well mixed.

Directions


With a peeler, start at the top and peel around the lemon in one spiral strand (without the pith).

Place the peel in a highball or Collins glass, and then fill glass with ice. Pour in the bourbon. Fill the rest of the glass with ginger ale and add the bitters.
